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# Staff Report to Council Open Meeting

Subject: Village Office LED Sign

### **Recommendations:**

THAT Council approve the purchase of a new LED sign for the Village Office with a budget of not more than twenty-three thousand dollars (\$23,000.00).

#### **Background:**

In 2010 a LED sign was purchased and installed in front of the Village Office. The sign proved to be very useful and informative. It advises the public of Council meetings, other community events and Village information. Over the years it had to withstand varying and extreme weather conditions and had parts replaced numerous times. At the end of 2020 it was no longer repairable. Council agreed to budget \$12,000.00 in the 2021 budget to purchase a new sign. Staff researched and found a sign that looked like it would do what was required. After a few months it was proven the sign did not function well and the display was not adequate. It was recently discussed at a past Council meeting that it was not being utilized the way the previous sign was. The current sign is very hard to program and the scrolling display is difficult to read. Staff has once again researched a new sign, its functionality and costs. Quotes have been obtained from two suppliers and they vary from \$18,900 to \$22,320.00. Both of these signs are high quality and the display is static, not scrolling.

#### **Financial Impacts:**

There was \$7000.00 unspent from the original budget in 2021. These funds would be combined with approximately \$3000.00 from the sale of the current sign. A maximum of \$13,000.00 from general surplus would be required to purchase a new sign. Community Forest Funds are not specifically allocated but combined with general surplus. They could be allocated in this instance for a new sign.
