Draft Resolution for support of continuation of Prince George to North Vancouver Railway Line

R046-26 THAT, Council approves the following draft resolution:

Whereas loss of the Squamish-Cariboo rail line which may ensue from CN Rail's plans announced in July 2025 to terminate its lease would result in shippers being forced to higher cost truck transport, increased public highway maintenance costs, loss of passenger (tourist or commuter) rail opportunity, higher GHG emissions, loss of transportation corridor redundancy affecting Western Canada, and constrained regional economic development;

And whereas rail discontinuance policies applying to the former BC Rail line do not necessarily take into account regional and long-term transportation needs and priorities and might frustrate economic viability of potential new short line operators, while infrastructure funding solutions for this valuable rail line's maintenance are lacking;

Therefore, resolved that the provincial and federal governments be encouraged to consider a new regional authority or ownership structure including First Nations and transition to a short line operator model to support regional enterprise while maintaining the strategic redundancy of the line;

And be it therefore resolved that senior governments be encouraged to consider potential public-private rail line maintenance funding solutions.

Re: LETTER OF SUPPORT – for Whispering Pines Clinton Indian Band to include into a Funding Application for Highest and Best Use Planning

Background:

- The Community Opportunity and Readiness Program (CORP) has been identified as a funding source to support the Highest and Best Use Plan. CORP is an Indigenous Services Canada program (<https://www.sac-isc.gc.ca/eng/1100100033417/1613659339457>) intended to fill the gap in project funding in First Nation communities to pursue economic and business development opportunities. The expected results of the program are to assist First Nations implement economic and business development opportunities.
- The draft WPCIB Economic Development Plan has identified the need for highest and best use (HBU) planning for WPCIB's fee simple properties. The results of the highest and best use will determine what opportunities and constraints exist for economic development at each property.

Opportunities:

- For the Village of Clinton to provide a 'letter of support' for WPCIB's application for funding. Project purpose: to evaluate each property in a way that supports economic opportunity, reflecting stewardship values, and strengthening long-term decision-making for WPCIB.
- Submission date for the CORP application is Wednesday March 11th, 2026.

Recommendations

It is recommended the following are approved and authorized for Action:

1. Authorize the Village of Clint to provide a 'Letter of Support' to strengthen WPCIB's application for funding to the CORP program.
2. Authorize to email the 'Letter of Support' to Michael Eibl Economic Development.

RE: Amendment Bylaw 2918, 2026 - Effective April 1, 2026 Amendment to User Fees

This letter is to advise that on March 5, 2026 the TNRD Board of Directors has adopted Amendment Bylaw 2918, 2026 updating the user fee schedules for weight-based and volume-based rates. These changes will take effect April 1, 2026.

These adjustments are consistent with the user-pay principle outlined in the TNRD Solid Waste Management Plan. As waste handling costs continue to rise, updating user fees helps ensure that taxpayers do not absorb the increased expenses. The TNRD continues to maintain some of the lowest user fees in the Southern Interior.

Municipalities are charged the household refuse rate for regular garbage collected at the curb and from most commercial bins. The household refuse rate will increase by 5% from \$90/tonne to \$94.50/tonne. Additional adjustments include raising the bagged garbage fee to \$2.00 per bag, increasing concrete from \$30/tonne to \$50/tonne and applying a 5% increase to all other user fees. The updated fee schedule is attached for your reference.

1. Call to Order

- B. Doddridge called meeting to order at 10:02 AM

2. Territorial Acknowledgement

-B. Doddridge gave the territorial acknowledgement

3. Welcome

-B. Doddridge did a quick welcome to everyone attending the meeting with a purpose statement of the FireSmart Committee is to guide, coordinate, and support wildfire risk reduction initiatives within the community by advancing education, planning, mitigation projects, and interagency collaboration in alignment with FireSmart principles.

4. Adoption of Previous Minutes

5. Event Update-Drop in Booth with BCWF

-T. Folstrom gave an update on the event held February 27. Between 50-60 residents stopped in for questions and information on FireSmart and the prescribed burn. Seven residents signed up for wildfire mitigation home assessments. B. Doddridge thanked S. Harry and his crew for coming and supporting the event.

6. Crown Land Mitigation Projects

-T. Folstrom gave update on the prescription for FTU 2 and FTU 22, stating that it is being worked on. The consultant has completed boundary layout, GPS and mapping. They also completed overstory and understory sampling of both units. G. Best asked which forester is contracted for this prescription T. Folstrom replied it is G. Wood with GO Wood Forestry Services Ltd.

7. Community Chipping Day

-T. Folstrom shared the idea of having the chipping day in April, which would include curbside pickup. S. Harry has confirmed that Ts'kw'aylaxw does not have a chipper. Whispering Pines.Clinton Indian Band was not at the meeting but T. Folstrom will follow-up with them on the availability of their chipper. G. Best will check with BC Wildfire to see if they have a chipper that we could use for this day along with some support. J. McKague said that they would like to be aware of the chipping day and if we can support them in chipping their pile, they have mitigated behind their office that is on the edge of Clinton but within the Village boundaries.

8. Wildfire Preparedness Day

-T. Folstrom expressed that she would like partnership this year, G. Best will check if they can come down for the event, K. Hansen said the fire department can get some firetrucks down to have sprinklers going. B. Doddridge suggested that we do the event before Wildfire season and keep the same date yearly. S. Law suggested the event be

hosted in May. The committee will have a meeting closer to event to plan out the logistics. G. Best suggested workdays would be better for BCWF to attend.

9. Plant Program

T. Folstrom announced that FireSmart has partnered with Home Hardware to bring in the plant program, they will have tagged plants that are fire resistant. There will be an event for this on May 16, 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. B. Doddridge expressed that it might be a good idea to involve Communities in Bloom with this event. T. Folstrom will be reaching out to them for support with the function and hoping D. Schapansky can help with cooking some hotdogs for the event.

10. Budget and Program Updates

-T. Folstrom stated that the funding deadline is April 23 and reporting due by May 23, she stated that she has sent the application in on Jan 30. CRI has added more values in the guide that the grant will cover. There is now a separate application for Fuel Mitigation.

11. Senior and Mobility Registration

-B. Doddridge introduced the item and said it is more of an emergency management then a FireSmart item. T. Folstrom explained that it is a voluntary and confidential program designed to support residents who may require additional assistance during emergencies. Seniors and individuals with mobility, medical or accessibility challenges can register their information with the municipality so emergency responders can better plan for evacuations. The registry helps ensure vulnerable residents are identified and supported while strengthening community emergence preparedness and resilience. The Village opened the registry up last year and have had only 2 residents sign up. T. Folstrom is hoping that committee can help get the word out for this. J. A Bylaw to amend “Bylaw No. 561, 2019 – Fire Department Remuneration

The Council of the Village of Clinton, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. TITLE

This Bylaw may be cited as “Bylaw No. 611, 2026 Fire Department Remuneration Amendment Bylaw”.

2. AMENDMENTS

The Village of Clinton Bylaw No. 561, 2019 Fire Department Remuneration is hereby amended as follows:

(i.) By amending section 2 as follows:

Commencing on January 1, 2026, the Fire Chief shall be paid an annual remuneration of Four Thousand Dollars, (4,000.00). The remuneration shall be paid on a semi-annual basis, in two equal installments, at month end June and December.

(ii.) By amending Section 3 as follows:

Commencing on January 1, 2026, the Deputy Fire Chief shall be paid an annual remuneration of Two Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$2,300.00). The remuneration shall be paid on a semi-annual basis, in two equal installments, at month end June and December.
